






Planning Ahead for NEXT YEAR

Last year in this newsletter we wrote that we were at the end of arguably the most unique school year in the 47-year history of our region. The 2020-21 school year proved even more extraordinary as we were one of few regions that returned to school five-days-per-week, dutifully wearing our masks and social distancing. Students and staff rose to the occasion and forged ahead teaching, learning, exploring and playing in new imaginative ways. As the pandemic began to subside and restrictions were loosened, we were able to resume a few activities reminiscent of years past, such as outdoor field days and our traditional graduation ceremony with friends and family in attendance.

Now we look to next year. On May 4, the towns of Lyme and Old Lyme approved a \$34.87 million budget for the 2021-22 school year. We have submitted the Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan as required by the state of CT. The plan outlines our intention to return to a more typical school setting so long as it is safe to do so. It includes details such as masks only being required should public health measures dictate a need for them, as well as some of the implemented good hygiene practices that will remain in place such as the handwashing stations installed this past year. Facilities UPDATES

Lyme-Old Lyme Schools have received federal relief funds and will use those funds to build outdoor classrooms at Mile Creek, Lyme School, and the middle school. The outdoor pavilion at Mile Creek is being built in partnership with students at Vinal Technical High School in Middletown. The relief funds will also allow for playground renovations and replacement of certain pieces of outdated equipment at Mile Creek, Lyme School and Center School.

The tennis courts at Lyme School will be resurfaced this summer and the front steps, which are crumbling, will be repaired.

The multi-purpose athletic field is currently under construction with the artificial playing surface expected to be ready for use at the beginning of the school year.
