

Lyme-Old Lyme Schools Excel Despite Pandemic in State Rankings

In August our schools received the results of highly anticipated state-wide achievement data. This standardized-testing information is an important factor in understanding how schools, especially in light of the pandemic and all of the associated challenges, are faring. We were thrilled to see that the average scores are some of the highest in the past five years and were on par with pre-pandemic testing.

While results varied by region, the State of Connecticut saw an overall decline in scores. Our strong results are a testament to the decision to remain in-school full time during the 2020-2021 school year, to our excellent teachers, our dedicated administration and staff, and to the support of the Lyme and Old Lyme communities.

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Region 18 Bond Referendum

On November 8, a referendum will be held for the purpose of voting for the approval or disapproval of a proposal to issue bonds to address facilities needs in our schools. The Board of Education voted to submit the proposal to voters after a planning process lasting multiple years that included evaluations from qualified firms and input from parents, staff and community members.

What is the purpose and intent of the proposal?

To appropriate and authorize funds to address the following needs:

- Replacing and repairing heating, ventilation, and air-conditioning systems at Center School, Mile Creek School, Lyme School, and Lyme-Old Lyme Middle School.
- Bringing these same four schools up to current code compliance for accessibility, safety, security, and other building and fire code requirements.
- Adding additional classroom space to Mile Creek School.

Did you know?

- Our schools were last renovated between 18 and 20 years ago. Mile Creek and Lyme School were renovated in 2002, the Lyme-Old Lyme Middle School in 2003, and Center School in 2004.
- Our student population is increasing, particularly at the Pre-K and elementary levels. We now have approximately 1,300 students from Pre-K through Grade 12. We are projected to have 1,445 students by 2026 and 1,673 students by 2031.
- If approved, projects would go out to bid with a completion goal of August 2025. The bond amount represents a "not to exceed" figure which includes contingency and escalation costs.
