<p>The School: Lyme-Old Lyme High School is a regional high school with approximately 480 students in grades 9-12 from the towns of Old Lyme and Lyme. The school district provides bus transportation for 98% of the student population. Students also have the option of enrolling in either a regional vocational-technical school or a regional vocational-agricultural school. Program offerings include the University of Connecticut Early College Experience, the College Board Advanced Placement Program, a partnership with Three Rivers Community-Technical College, and the High School Scholars Program through both Connecticut College and Wesleyan University. The Lyme-Old Lyme High School also offers courses through Virtual High School (online courses), an interscholastic sports program, driver's education, summer school and a close collaboration with the Lymes' Youth Service Bureau.</p> <p>Lyme- Old Lyme High School employs 54 certified faculty including 3 School Counselors, a School Psychologist and five Special Education Teachers.</p> <p>Lyme-Old Lyme High School is accredited by the New England Association of School and Colleges and the Connecticut State Department of Education. <p>The Old Lyme & Lyme Communities: Lyme & Old Lyme are located on the shore where the Connecticut River meets the Long Island Sound; 13 miles west of New London; off Exit 70 of I-95. Easy access to larger towns and cities via route 95 allows many to access professional work commitments while establishing residence in a small town. The year-round population is approximately 7400 in Old Lyme, 1,970 in Lyme. This suburban, middle to upper income level community is very supportive of the arts, STEM, athletics, community partnerships and they are committed to providing an comprehensive education for their youth.</p>	<p>Co-Curricular Opportunities: Lyme-Old Lyme High School offers a full interscholastic athletic program with 13 teams for boys (including cooperative teams for ice hockey and football) and 14 teams for girls. Many opportunities are available in drama, music, and a wide variety of special interest clubs, such as Amnesty International, DECA, Osprey Newspaper, High School Bowl, Mock Trial, Robotics, Student Leaders, WLYM school television station, and many more, totaling 38 clubs.</p>

Students must also reach established testing requirements on the NGSS and CT School Day SAT as established by the Connecticut State Department of Education.

All students must carry 6.5 credits; all seniors must pass 4.5 credits in their senior year to graduate. The majority of students carry 7 or more credits.

Grade Point Average (GPA):

Lyme-Old Lyme High School does not utilize a class ranking system. GPA is cumulative and includes all courses and is represented on a 100 point scale.

✿ For GPA purposes, AP & UCONN ECE courses are weighted by 1.1 (i.e. 80=88); Level 1 classes are weighted by 1.05 (i.e. 80=84).

✿ Cumulative (8 semesters) GPA deciles for the class of 2018 are: 1st decile: 103.34—99.57, 2nd decile: 99.43—96.65, 3rd decile: 96.55—94.67, 4th decile: 94.58—93.08, 5th decile: 92.65—91.48, 6th decile: 91.43—89.01, 7th decile: 88.85—86.84, 8th decile: 86.52—83.46, 9th decile: 83.08—78.55, 10th decile: 78.19—68.74.

Fifteen AP courses are offered: Biology, Calculus (AB), Chemistry, Chinese Language, English Literature, European History, French Language, Music Theory, Physics II, Psychology, Spanish Language, Statistics, Studio Art: Drawing, Studio Art: 3-D Design and US History. Additional AP courses are available through the VHS program.

Thirteen UCONN ECE Courses available:

Biology, Intermediate Chinese II, Drawing, English, French Language & Comp, French Global Culture, Topics in Adv. Latin, Fundamentals of Music, Music Appreciation, Physics I and II, Spanish Conv/Culture and Spanish Intermediate Comp.

147 students sat for 263 exams in 20 subjects; 203 exams were scored a 3, 4 or 5.
